Happy New Year! I hope we are all able to take a big breath now that all the holiday services are behind us.

As I've said in the past, my job at Assumption is two-fold: teaching in the school during the week, and playing the organ for five Masses each weekend plus organizing repertoire for both school and church. On Tuesday, December 11, we had our school Christmas concert. This year we performed in the gym and not the church for one reason only: so we could have hospitality. With that being said, we had to transform the cavernous gym into an inviting Christmas wonderland. We borrowed risers from a local high school, we took the 'Advent' trees, wreaths and banners from the church, set up seating for 300 people, and had families each bring a dessert to share. The day after the concert, we had to return everything to its proper place. It was like when WE were children, we would secretly open our gifts under the Christmas tree, only to rewrap them back up perfectly so our parents would not know what we did! Transforming the gym was a lot of extra work, but it was well worth the effort. As the principal said at the end of the concert, "Mr Vaughan has these ideas in his mind, and we saw them play out magically this evening."

In the past, I have accompanied each grade's piece on the electric piano. This year, because the orchestral accompaniments were so fantastic, we purchased the performance accompaniments for the 15 pieces we sang. These were not cheap to buy, but well worth the cost. We do all secular music for the Christmas and Spring concerts because the children need to experience other types of music besides sacred. There is so much great secular Christmas music for choirs out there. This is not kiddie music, by the way.

My goal with every grade is for them to know the music so well that they wouldn't need me to conduct. Well, I told 3rd Grade that before their piece, and indeed I walked away, amazing all the parents. I stood in the back to listen. The principal, when I passed him in the back of the gym, asked if I was on auto-pilot. The 3rd Grade aced the piece called Candy-Covered Gingerbread House.

The 8th Grade sang a piece called Mrs Claus. It is a real cute piece with a lot of text to memorize. Anyway, when I had the class listen to the piece that they were going to learn in

I am the founding director of the East Texas Pipe Organ Festival in Kilgore, Texas. We host an annual week-long organ festival featuring the area's Aeolian-Skinner pipe organs. We also have our own recording label, and are re-issuing the existing master tapes of Aeolian-Skinner's "King of Instruments" series. We have recently issued Richard Purvis' recording from the series, which was recorded at Grace Cathedral in 1955.



Taken from the original Aeolian-Skinner master tapes, this historic recording features Richard Purvis playing his own music on the organ of Grace Cathedral. Included in the recording are Partita on Christ ist Erstanden, Pastorale on Forest Green, Adoration, Divinum Mysterium, Capriccio on the Notes of the Cuckoo, Introit and Elevation, and two additional tracks of previously unreleased material. The CD booklet includes Purvis' bio, description and stoplist of the organ, notes on the repertoire and registration, and vintage photos courtesy of the Grace Cathedral Archives. Recording is in MONO.

Our poor Rieger Organ is half dead and not available for recitals just now. It is a tragic mess. Working with John Hupalo, I've been able to work out a good plan to restore this magnificent organ to its former glory. You might get a chuckle from "My Story" below:

Many years ago there were some beautiful trees that were chosen to be part of an adventure that would delight and please many in days to come. These trees and their metal companions met in a beautiful Austrian village. Kind artists who cared about the future of these trees and their metal companions lovingly made them into many different shapes.

After many months of careful attention, all of these new creations were carefully placed in boxes, covered with great care and placed in huge cargo containers to be sent to people who promised to love and care for these creations of the Austrian workers. It was a very happy and joyous day when the containers holding all of these boxes arrived at their destination. People greeted this arrival and lovingly carried each new piece into a very large building. Home at last after such a journey!

Yes, the Pacific Union College SDA Church had welcomed its newest member, the lovely Rieger Pipe Organ. After the Austrian crew arrived to put each pipe where it belonged, and erect the beautiful structure to hold them, there was great anticipation of hearing what they would sound like. These creations from loving hands, both metal and wood, never disappointed anyone when they were first allowed to send their beauty into the church for all to hear: church services, great hymn singing, alumni weekends, graduations, guest artists, weddings and memorials plus so much more.

Today the nearly 40-year-old grand lady is not sounding as she once did. She has many pipes who have aged and shrunk, with their toes being bent out of shape. She has been walked on, pounded on and has been the recipient of earthquake damage, humidity and heat problems — and like everyone else, there is wear and tear everywhere you look. Only half of the pipes play while the others sit and wonder when their turn will be.

"Miss Rieger" would like to be able to continue to use her trumpets for graduations and other services. She would also like to accompany hymn singing once again. The many recitals have had to stop but we know they can start again with your help. Would you consider helping to put this grand lady back into service? With the help of many, we can have a new beginning. We hope to have Phase One (\$60,000) completed by the end of January and with your help we can begin Phase Two (\$240,000) as well. No frills, no "dreams" just plain oldfashioned maintenance that has been deferred for far too


In this New Year, would YOU consider:

Some music for CHRISTMAS

One of my favorite pieces to play on Christmas Eve or Day is Thomas Geischen's Pastorale on Silent Night. The composition has two versions, one as an organ solo [Concordia 97-5154] and the other for strings & oboe or flute [Concordia 97-5170] available as a downloadable pdf. The piece was composed in 1973, and utilizes gentle rocking figures in 12/8 meter.

A must-have collection of useful pieces for the Christmas season is The Oxford Book of Christmas Organ Music, Oxford Univ. Press, 1995. The selections range from Buxtehude to contemporary English and American composers. The book contains 37 Christmas organ selections on over 100 pages.
