Dean's Message

I hope you are looking back to a nice Thanksgiving holiday last week, one that might have been different than ever before! With travel restrictions due to the pandemic, I hope that you all were still able to connect virtually with family and friends. During this pandemic, there is still so much to be grateful for. My family is especially grateful that everyone around us stayed healthy and safe. I much hope that all your family members are doing well!

This year's Thanksgiving was very unusual for us as it meant strict quarantining. In all previous years we would invite friends to our cottage in Truckee and spend beautiful days in the mountains enjoying each other's company. This time, we just had returned from Europe a few days before Thanksgiving. We had travelled to Germany at the end of August to support my 86-year old mother, who had by that time spent most of 2020 in isolation at her home in Bad Reichenhall, 10 miles from Salzburg. By the middle of August, she had not seen anyone of her family in person, had lost hope, and could not find anything she would be looking forward to anymore. Normally, our two boys spend their summer in Bad Reichenhall with her, but already in spring Lufthansa had cancelled their flights due to Covid. When we arrived at SFO in August to travel to Germany, the airport felt like a ghost town: All shops were closed except a few coffee shops; on the plane where normally 144 people would find their seats, there were only 15 travelers in that same area; at the baggage claim in Munich's airport there were only a couple of passengers with us awaiting half a dozen suitcases all together.

An international trip of approximately three months duration would have never been possible for us in regular years. Before Covid, my husband and I would be needed daily in our offices in the Bay area. That suddenly changed mid-March when on short notice we were all sent to work from home. 'Home' is a wide term here, as we can really work from any other location outside the office that suits us. We can work from almost anywhere, as long as we accommodate the working hours of 6am to 3pm PST.

S choenstein & Co. is building a new three-manual, 34-voice, 42-rank organ for the First United Methodist

Church of Montgomery, Alabama.

The main organ is in lofty chambers on either side of the chancel. The Antiphonal division is at the north and south corners of the balcony. The Swell division will include the Schoenstein double expression system for the chorus reeds including the 32' full length Contra Posaune, Mixture and the softest strings.

St Ignatius of Antioch Organ Revoiced

St Ignatius of Antioch Parish in Antioch, in Far East County, has been blessed with a magnificent Rodgers Hybrid Instrument of 19 ranks of premium pipework and 58 digital stops, three manuals and pedal. The genesis



of our organ project began in 2006 when a small, 20 stop Rodgers Instrument was brought to the church to be temporarily installed to see if the parish community liked it and as a result would raise the

funds to make its installation permanent. After six months, the parish community raised the necessary funds to make the instrument their own. On Ash Wednesday of 2006, as parishioners gathered for the Liturgies of Ash Wednesday, they heard the sound of what they thought was a pipe organ but asked "Where are the pipes?" That instrument served the parish community well until 2008 when a decision was made to take advantage of a larger instrument of three manuals and pedal, 58 stops of digital voices with pipe compatibility that had become available. The smaller instrument was then replaced by an instrument of a much greater capability to support and grow the parish's music ministry.

In 2010, it was learned that the Rodgers Organ Builders, with a studio in Pleasanton, was closing and reached out to us, knowing that we had dreamed of interfacing our instrument with pipework. They had three ranks of premium pipework from PMS in England that were coming available. An anonymous donor provided the funds necessary to purchase the three ranks of pipes and the beautiful casework that housed them. The pipes and casework were brought to Antioch and installed in time for Thanksgiving that year by Bob Knight of Knight Organ Builders in Southern California. The interfacing of the pipework was completed and for the first time the congregation heard the blending of wind-blown pipes with digital voices.

In 2012, we were made aware that a Methodist church in a suburb of Boston, MA, was selling their Rodgers Organ with nineteen ranks of pipes. While we had the latest Rodgers Instrument with the updated technology and three ranks of pipes, we didn't need the console from the Methodist church but began a series of conversations that led to the purchase of their pipework. Had we not been able to purchase their pipes which were created by Organ Supply of Erie, Pennsylvania, they would have ended up being thrown out. The pipework was crated and shipped, along with their

chest, windlines, rectifiers, and blowers to Antioch. What a great day it was when the pipes arrived and were carried into the parish hall to be prepared for installation.

The installation wasn't as "turn-key" as hoped, and our Maintenance Manager, Rich Confetti, and his assistant, Don Benson, had to completely re-wire all the chests in order for the new pipework to be interfaced with our existing instrument. The Rodgers Organ Builders provided their state-of-the-art PIM (Pipe Interface Module) that made the seamless interface of the pipes and digital voices work. Again, Bob Knight and Dr Robert Tall worked together on the installation to make it successful.

When the instrument from Boston was originally installed, it was done in a sanctuary that seated 1,500 people. The seating capacity of St Ignatius of Antioch is 550. While the pipework was successful, it was voiced for the much larger building rather than the smaller and more intimate space of St Ignatius of Antioch. We knew that at some point, all the pipework would have to be re-voiced and regulated for its new home.

That hope and dream was finally made possible the week of November 9 through 13 when Dr Robert Tall and Christian Lentz, Master Voicer, came to Antioch to revoice our instrument and balance the pipework and digital stops. Each day, from 9:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m., Dr Tall and



Christian worked meticulously, professionally, and lovingly to take each pipe in hand and make it speak in a way we never dreamed possible. The 19 ranks of pipes form complete principal choruses on both the Great and Choir divisions. The principal of the Great

Division now sings in the great English Tradition, with the 4' Octave and 2' Principal building on that gorgeous, lush 8' foundation. The principal chorus in the Choir Division is voiced with a slightly brighter edge than the principal chorus on the Great and both divisions are complemented by absolutely beautiful flute choruses speaking at 8', 4' and 2' pitches. The IV rank mixture of the Choir adds a silvery sparkle to the ensemble and the crowning glory of the

Great Division is its towering IV Mixture. All of the digital stops have been adjusted in tonal quality to complement

each of the pipe ranks. The string stops of each division have been created in the great tradition of Aeolian-Skinner and one cannot help but be moved as they are played, from the softest shimmer to the building crescendo of all the string stops coupled together. A variety of reed voices are available on each division representing the French, German, English,

and American Classic traditions that serve in their role as chorus reeds as well as thrilling solo reeds that soar over full organ.

We had always hoped and dreamed that our instrument had the potential for greatness once it was "finished" and re-voiced. We experienced that dream come true through the artistry of Dr Tall and Christian Lentz. The time that was taken to make

each pipe sound correctly and in harmony with all the other pipes of each rank, and making each rank play in balance with all the other ranks, and to experience them building, one upon another, was nothing short of magical. The end result is more than we could ever have hoped for. This is an instrument now sounding and playable in the great tradition of Aeolian-Skinner and the result of two

outstanding musicians and artists whose love for the organ made all the difference. We also are grateful for yet another anonymous donor without whose generosity the project of finishing the organ would never have happened.

Our instrument will continue to inspire, encourage, comfort, celebrate, and enrich

countless lives of those who come for worship for years to come. And, in the end, we will fulfill our goal: *Soli Deo Gloria - To God Alone Be The Glory.*

Augsburg Organ Library: Marriage

This collection is found in a series of the Augsburg Organ Library and includes volumes for Reformation, Christmas, Epiphany, Lent, and Summer, etc. This particular 160 page volume contains 40 pieces for worship or recitals especially suited for marriage ceremonies, including processionals, trumpet tunes, and settings of hymn tunes commonly sung at weddings. The Augsburg Organ Library is a highly acclaimed multi-volume series that reflects the twentieth century renewal of the organ and its music. This collection is also very useful for general prelude and postlude music.

Composers included in this collection: Vaughan Williams, Searle Wright, David Cherwien, Paul Manz, Gordon Young, Robert Powell, David N. Johnson, Tom Pavlechko (from Youngstown), and C.S. Lang among several others.

This change in the work environment made it possible for us to visit Hamburg and stay there with my mother for almost three months, working there online from the late afternoon hours into the night, due to the nine hours time difference.

When we arrived in Hamburg, our organist Tim (13 years) was very excited to play the different organs in the area. His highlight was playing the organs in St Jakobi, Lübeck. The Große Orgel and the Stellwagen-Orgel with their oldest parts go back to the 15th Century. First documentations of organ music in Lübeck go even back to the 14th Century. From 1931 to 1937 Hugo Distler was organist at St Jakobi, and since 2005 Arvid Gast is titular organist there. On a Saturday afternoon, he showed Tim the precious organs of St Jakobi.
