hile drafting this article, I am reflecting on how tremendously the world has changed since I wrote the last newsletter article only a few weeks ago. The coronavirus is changing our lives in ways unheard of before. Our idea of normality, public life, social gatherings — all this is being challenged as never before. So many of us cannot go to work and our children cannot go to day-care or school; churches, concert halls, theaters and stores are all closed, and maybe the worst: All of us are missing the many face-to-face encounters that are otherwise taken for granted. And all of us are wondering how long this will continue.

As in many unprecedented situations, it helps me to focus on the positive side of things. First of all, I feel very blessed that my work is especially meaningful to me during this time. My company is working on a treatment against COVID-19 and my teams are involved in getting this medication to patients around the world. All our business meetings are now held virtually, and the majority of folks are using video capabilities. Today, I had a zoom meeting with 181 participants. A few presenters, including myself, were switching roles seamlessly as the technology automatically puts the video of the speaker into the focus. With all the advances in technology it is amazing how little impact this tremendous change of our working environment has on the continuation of some critical businesses.

Secondly and fortunately, our chapter did not need to cancel any concerts so far. We had a spectacular performance of organ and piano on March 8th. This concert was co-sponsored with Mission Dolores Basilica, and its highlight was the

Symphonic Schoenstein to Charleston

Schoenstein & Co. is building a new three-manual, 14-voice, 16-rank organ for Bishop Gadsden Episcopal Retirement Community in Charleston, South Carolina.

It is in the symphonic style with Great and Swell enclosed and high pressure stops doubly enclosed within the Swell. The third manual borrows solo and ensemble stops from the Great and Swell. The beautiful and resonant chapel is in the traditional Southern Colonial style. The instrument will be free standing in a case elevated at the west end. Installation is scheduled for September 2020.



Musical advisor and organ consultant for the project is Nigel Potts, Canon Organist and Master of the Music, Grace Church Cathedral in Charleston. Cummings & McCrady, Inc. are architects of the Chapel and provided this rendering.



Some Easter organ music suggestions

Arne Organ Solos from the Concertos Edition Peters, Hinrichsen no. 1544

This delightful collection contains 4 movements from Arne's organ concertos arranged for organ solo. Thomas Arne, 1710–1778, was a contemporary of G.F. Handel. Like Handel's organ concertos, these pieces quickly found their way into keyboard arrangements. This collection was first published posthumously in the last 18th century. My favorites are no. 1 Allegro in C major from Concerto No. 1 and no. 3 Con Spirito in E major from Concerto No. 3, nicknamed "The Maggot". Arne's brisk and mostly 2-part writing is similar in style to Scarlatti's keyboard sonatas.

Voluntary No. 1 in D major by William Boyce

IMSLP. This popular Trumpet Voluntary opens with a slow Diapason movement followed by a Vivace that features the Trumpet and echos. The writing is in three parts without pedal. ▼
