Announcing the Publication of Dale Wood: The Man and the Music.

amiliar yet fresh, accessible yet ingenious, the works of California composer Dale Wood have become mainstays of the contemporary repertoire. Wood's deceptively

simple arrangements of heart-rending beauty immediately appeal to average listeners, yet reward the most accomplished organists and choral directors.

Who was Dale Wood? And what inspired his incomparable music?

In this first-ever biography, James Welch traces Wood's gifts for improvisation and arrangement to a keen ear and practical experi-

ence. Immersed from his youth in southern California's vast array of musical resources, Wood undertook but quickly rejected academic training, becoming essentially self-taught. He composed and performed for school productions and church services; did radio and TV work in Hollywood; played the Wurlitzer at the Orpheum in Los Angeles; directed music for churches in Hollywood, Riverside, and San Francisco; conducted choral workshops

across the country; and ultimately became executive editor of the Sacred Music Press, publishing numerous wellknown composers.

Wood's was an intriguing and colorful life, full of personalities and adventures. The reclusive arranger of hymns and folk tunes described himself as a hermit, yet served in the military, drove fast cars, explored wilderness from Death Valley to the High Sierra, entertained aboard cruise lines, served as a volunteer firefighter, performed in bars, sold organs, rescued German shepherds, wrote a music drama for the exclusive Bohemian Club, and experienced an unusual variety of personal relationships.

Welch is uniquely equipped to tell Wood's story. Having performed his music in services and recitals throughout the nation and around the globe, Welch began a friendly correspondence with the composer that blossomed into acquaintance and collaboration. Wood invited Welch to become a regular proofreader of his compositions, rewarding him with several dedications.

are without work due to the COVID-19 pandemic (https:// www.agohq.org/responding-to-covid-19/):

The ongoing coronavirus pandemic presents severe and unprecedented challenges for our organists and church musicians. Never in our nation's history have places of worship been faced with indefinite closure and on such a scale. While we are all left to figure out how to navigate this difficult time, the AGO Committee on Career Development and Support would like to offer this page as a resource to members. As the situation evolves, more resources will be added.

These AGO resources provide links that connect you to information regarding unemployment, recovering from job termination, online educational resources, the career hotline and a COVID-19 survey. Additional resources are also provided for artists with links to several relief funds, an unemployment benefits eligibility website, instructions for utilizing *Flipgrid* for classroom teachers and a guide for using *Zoom* for live-streamed lessons. Additionally, the AGO resources include links to some helpful articles and blogs that address what to do regarding cancellation of gigs and choral concerts. I also want to add an additional resource regarding basic protective measures against the new coronavirus and very useful information, which can be found on the WHO website (https://www.who.int/ emergencies/diseases/novel-coronavirus-2019/advicefor-public). If you are aware of additional resources that you would like to share with our community, please reach out as well. We will be very glad to share with our community, and also potentially adding to the national AGO community through the AGO site.

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Shelter-in-place is impacting me and my family in many different ways. My husband and I are both working from home all-day, while our two sons (Jan, 15, and Tim, 13) are staying in their rooms, logging into the programs of distant learning provided by their schools. To not be disturbed with background organ music while attending the many work-related Zoom meetings during my week day, we moved Tim's organ lessons to Saturday morning: around 10 a.m. on Saturdays, Tim and his teacher, Bill Vaughan, meet via FaceTime. Tim is playing on a Rodgers Inspire Series 233 in his room, while my cell phone is set up on a tripod for Bill to have full overview of keyboards and pedals. The video and audio quality is sufficient to ensure an effective lesson; once in a while I get called in by Tim to hold the cell phone right from the top to the keyboards, allowing Bill to fully evaluate Tim's fingering.

Before I share the exciting program plan for our 2020–2021 season, I need to make an important announcement which is very sad but not unexpected during these times: We regret to inform you that our annual dinner and choral concert originally scheduled for the evening of May 18th at St Dominic's Church had to be postponed. Together with the directors of this program, Simon Berry and Eric Choate, we are now looking into rescheduling to October 2020. We will announce the new date as we get closer to the event. Normally we would share the next season's program with you during our annual dinner event in May. As I am sharing the preliminary program in this article, let's all pray and hope that we will be able to meet in person as the wonderful community we are, starting in September already — even if social distancing and hygiene measures might then still be in place. Many of our venues are big enough to ensure social distancing while enjoying concerts together:

- On September 3rd, 2020, we want to kick-off the 2020– 2021 season with a Baptist Service followed by dinner at the Third Baptist Church in San Francisco under the musical direction of James Smith, our current subdean elect.
- As stated, we are looking into holding the Choral Concert at St Dominic's, originally planned for May 2020, now in early- to mid-October under the direction of Simon Berry and Eric Choate.

• On October 30th, we will meet at the Congregational Church of San Mateo for the Youth Halloween Concert annually directed by Angela Kraft Cross.

- On November 8th, we are looking into co-hosting both the Second Sunday Series at St Mark's Berkeley (George Emblom) especially for our members located in the East Bay, and at Mission Dolores Basilica (Jerome Lenk), especially for our members closer to San Francisco.
- In December we will have a member's Christmas Party. Elizabeth Forsyth will be opening her home – thanks, Liz! More information, also on the date to come as we get closer.
- On January 24th 2021, we will be co-hosting Weicheng Zhao (https://allsaints-pas.org/more/contact-us/ weicheng-zhao/) at Grace Cathedral, music director Ben Bachmann and assistant Christopher Keady.
- On February 15th, we will build out on the success of our organ crawl this year in San Francisco: In 2021 we will be visiting four different churches than we visited this year. We are planning to include St Mark's Lutheran Church, First Unitarian Church, Old First Church and Grace Cathedral.
- In March, we are planning on co-hosting an organ concert by Amanda Mole (http://www.concertorganists.com/ artists/amanda-mole/) at St John's Episcopal Church in San Francisco together with music director Daniel Gonzalez.
- We are also looking into a Member's Recital in March 2021. Both March dates will be announced as we get closer.


- On April 25th, Olivier Latry (http://www. concertorganists.com/artists/olivier-latry/) will perform at St Mary's Cathedral in San Francisco, hosted by music director Christopher Tietze.
- Our 2020–2021 program will conclude with a choir concert and annual dinner on May 24th 2021 at St Stephen's Episcopal Church, Belvedere. The board members enjoying cooking and baking will be your chefs on that evening, utilizing the high-tech kitchen at St Stephen's. Thanks to music director John Hirten!

During the Annual Dinner on May 18th, 2020, and under normal circumstances, we would have announced the program for the 2020–2021 season as well as any personnel changes to our board as a result of the elections we would have held if the coronavirus crisis had not hit us. AGO headquarters is fully aware, and we encountered difficulties — similar to other chapters — in recruiting for those positions that will need to be filled for the 2020–2021 season. I want to give full transparency on the changes we are encountering:

- Our Secretary position will become vacant. We are grateful for Elizabeth Forsyth's service in this role for three years thank you, Liz! What a great pleasure to have worked with you on the board, you will be missed!
- Our Treasurer position will become vacant, as Michael Page has now completed his three years in this role – thanks so much, Michael – you made a difference on the many board meetings!
- With these changes, Bill Vaughan will take on the role as Treasurer, leaving the Subdean position to James Smith, our current Subdean Elect.
- I will continue to serve in the role of Dean, until we are ready to nominate the new Subdean Elect for the 2020– 2021 season. At that time we will hold the board elections – stay tuned!
